 - Social Role Valorization: Understand how this concept extends normalization and shapes the roles individuals with disabilities play in society positively.
 - Challenging Outdated Perceptions: Challenge historical devaluation of individuals with disabilities and advocate for a more inclusive society, emphasizing informed consent in service delivery.
 - Impact of Colonialism and Capitalism: Explore how colonialism and capitalism have shaped our perception of impairment and disability in society.
 - Identity First Language and Neurodiversity: Learn about Identity First Language, Person-First Language, and the concept of neurodiversity, which emphasizes the uniqueness of human brains.
